From the Minister

Our January theme is "finding our center." It's a good topic for the New Year, or indeed anytime. Life can get so frittered away by distractions, we lose track of what is our center – what we're really about at our core, individually or collectively.

The Greek philosophers loved to talk about telos, a Greek word that translates roughly as "purpose." When you know the telos of something, it helps to make decisions. The telos of a cup, usually, is to hold liquids. So if it fails to do that well – you might want to recycle or repurpose it. The telos of a TV is to entertain and inform us. That's the idea, anyway; I know some who don't have a TV because it has failed to do just that. But what's the telos of a social justice meeting, or a meditation practice? What's the telos of a congregation, or a denomination? Or for that matter, what's the telos of a human being?

These questions may not have simple, agreed-upon answers. Nevertheless, it's worth thinking about what it is really "all about." If we know that, everything else – is just details.

SUNDAY SERVICE SCHEDULE JOIN US EVERY SUNDAY AT 10:30AM

January 8 - A Ritual of Letting Go, Cleansing, Intention and Hope - Rev. Diane Diachishin (In-person & Zoom) (No RE and Childcare available)

On or near the first Sunday in January, many Unitarian Universalist congregations hold a ritual to bid farewell to the old year, and to release it. This celebration separates the end of the year from the beginning, helping us to put in perspective the joys and sorrows, the changes and transitions, the ups and downs of the year. It's a half-way point in our church year, but a celebration of the outside calendar's year's end and year's beginning. In a ceremony, people will be invited to write down words, or a phrase, to sum up what they wish to release before entering the new year. They then come forward to put behind what they wish to leave from the old year, placing their wishes in a communal bowl. Afterwards, flowers will be used to celebrate renewal for the new year.

January 15 - The Beloved Community - Rev. Bob Janis

(In-person & Zoom) (RE and No Childcare)

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and others, spoke of the "beloved community" as a place we could create to counter the evils of poverty, racism, and militarism. Here at UU Catskills, "Community" is one of our values, along with "Growth", "Action", and "Diversity." This service will explore whether the beloved community is feasible here in our community – and in the world at large. It will also keep people up to speed on new developments in this interim time.

January 22 - Principles and Purpose, Faith and Freedom - Rev. Bob Janis

(In-person & Zoom) (RE and Childcare available)

A "revision to Article 2" doesn't sound very exciting – but it's quite important when it

contains the seven principles and six sources that have served as a central expression of Unitarian Universalism. A look at what the core of Unitarian Universalism is all about – and where we may be headed.

January 29 - Wicca, Gnosticism, and Anthroposophy - Barbara Kidney and Andrew Dalton (Zoom) (No RE and No Childcare)

Barbara and Andrew will be speaking about their connections with Wicca, Gnosticism, and Anthroposophy, and how they perceive these non-mainstream spiritual traditions resonate with Unitarian Universalism. With their lively wit and keen interest in these traditions, this promises to be an informative and entertaining service.

From the UU Catskills President

As we start a new year, it is time to look back at what we have accomplished and look forward to what yet remains to be done. This past year we rode the covid waves as we opened, then closed, then reopened again for live services and meetings in the Sanctuary. Recently the Board voted to retain masking for services and RE (to keep them safe and open to all), and to make our post-service social hour mask-optional and to allow groups to determine their own masking policy for meetings in the Sanctuary.

We started this year with a Chalice Lighters Grant that has helped us to conduct quality hybrid services and to streamline our communications. The Tech and Worship Committees have worked hard to make our hybrid services as accessible and appealing as possible. Both committees need volunteers to help to take us to the next step—live services every Sunday in the Sanctuary, which we hope to initiate sometime this spring. We have updated our communications platform with a few hiccups along the way. These should dissipate as this new way of communicating becomes more settled and everyday.

We started this year with a solid Board made up of several ex-Presidents and long-time Board members. However, several of us have reached the limits of our terms, and we must make way for the next group of UUCC leaders. The Pledge, Fundraising and Nomination Committees remain vacant in need of engaged members as well. To raise awareness of these opportunities, we will have a Volunteer Sunday on January 15 following the Service. A list of positions with descriptions of the workings of each will be provided to attendees, and members of the various committees will be available to answer questions. Finally, we are in the midst of a Ministerial Search that will culminate in the spring. While the Ministerial Search Committee is doing most of the preliminary work, a ministerial search is ultimately an all-congregation affair. Please get engaged in the process, as we move forward. Whoever is chosen will be your minister for quite some time.

This is a great time to get involved at UUCC. We welcome you and your talents. Make this a year of re-engagement following all the disconnections of Covid.

We want to extend our collective appreciate to Amanda Williams, who has been our marketing consultant since June. Amanda has helped us "find our center" as a congregation, helping us come to our sense of who we really are, how we communicate who we are, and how we grow. Also, she stepped up in the interim between our office administrators, kindly staying on to produce our newsletter and weekly updates. Thank you, Amanda, for your vision, wisdom, flexibility and hard work.

COMMON READ: THE 8TH PRINCIPLE

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

This fall, Rev. Bob facilitated two discussions on the UUA Common Read book Mistakes and Miracles. Through detailing the experiences of 5 UU congregations who are on an 8th Principle journey, the book explores what it means to become a "multicultural congregation" and describes how different communities approach this work. Due to expected weather, the third scheduled book discussion was postponed until January 26th. You do not have to have read the book to attend. Our congregational engagement with the proposed 8th Principle does not end here. Rev. Bob and others will consider what this work might look like at UUCatskills, and offer some proposals to the leadership.


GREAT BOOKS SERIES

FOOD JUSTICE WORKING GROUP


